## STRONG JUMP SHIFTS

**Strong Jump Shifts** can be very helpful if used in a disciplined way. Responder makes a strong jump shift in only 3 situations:

- 1) a Solid Suit plus opening bid strength
- 2) A good 6-card suit and 18 or 19 HCP
- 3) A good suit plus a big fit with partner.

A **solid suit** is defined as AKQxxxx or AKQJxx. AKQ10xx is not sufficient. You expect to take 6 tricks in your suit even if partner has a singleton. If you jump shift and then jump to game on the next round [1C-P-2S-P-3C-P-4S], you show the good suit, but no slam interest, e.g., AKQxxxx x Jx Kxx. If you jump shift and make a simple rebid of your suit on the next round [1C-P-2S-P-2NT-P-3S], you show a solid suit with slam interest, e.g., AKQJxx AQx xx Qx. If you jump in a new suit on your rebid [1D-P-2H-P-2NT-P-4C], you show a solid suit, singleton in the second suit, and a minimum jump shift, e.g., xx AKQJxxx Qxx x

## The second type of strong jump shift requires:

- 1) a 6-card suit headed by 2 of the top 3 honors
- 2) a stopper in each unbid suit so that responder can bid NT if opener does not
- 3) 18-19 HCP
- 4) no singleton

Example: Kx KQ9xxx AQ10 Ax

The **third type of strong jump shift**, responder has a good suit plus a good fit with partner.

- 1) With 5/4/2/2 distribution, responder needs a minimum of a great 14 HCP, e.g., 1C-P-2S AQ10xx xx Kx KQ10x
  - 2) If responder jump shifts and then bids a new suit, his second bid shows a singleton with 4 card support for opener's suit: 1C-P-2S-P-3C-P-3D AK10xx Kxx x AQJx
- 3) A highly distributional jump shift could have as few as a fabulous 10 or 11 HCP. Consider: 1C-P-2H with responder holding: x AK109x xx K10xxx.

If Opener has as little as:xxx Qx Axx Axxxxx, slam is very likely.

## **Opener's Rebids**

It is understood that the contract will end up in NT, the suit opened, or the suit in which Responder jumped. Therefore, Opener should not be bidding a new suit. Emphasis is on:

- 1. to raise if possible
- 2. to rebid his/her own good suit
- 3. to rebid NT if appropriate
- 4. to show a concentration of strength

Examples: 1C-P-2H-P Bid 3H with xxx Kxx AJx KQxx

1C-P-2H-P. Bid 3C with Kxx xx Qxx AQJxx (better than bidding 2NT because clubs are excellent and diamond stopper is iffy.)

1C-P-2H-P. Bid 2NT with KJX Jx KQ10 Kxxxx or Qxxx xx KQJ KQ10x--Spades too weak to bid 1C-P-2H-P. Bid 3D to show a concentration of strength with Qxxx x AKJ QJxxx
